Composition:

- Use nouns and pronouns for variety.
- Write about more than one idea.
- Group related information.

Punctuate accurately:

- Use subordination (when, if, that or because).
- Use coordination (or, and, but).

Religious Education:

Norfolk Syllabus-

All religions - What do my senses tell me about the world of religion and belief?

Core knowledge from Syllabus:

Maths:

Number-

Methods-

• Calculate mathematical statements for multiplication and division within the multiplication tables and write them using the multiplication (x), division (\div) and equals (=) signs.

Fractions-

- Recognise, find and name a half as one of two equal parts of an object, shape or quantity.
- Recognise, find and name a quarter as one of four equal parts of an object, shape or quantity.

Position-

• Describe position, direction and movement, including whole, half, quarter and three-quarter turns.

Measure-

• Compare and order lengths, mass, volume/capacity and record the results using >, < and =.

Read write Inc. Phonics set 4/5.

- Read accurately books that are consistent with their developing phonic knowledge and that do not require them to use other strategies to work out words.
- Re-read these books to build up their fluency & confidence in word reading.

Topic: Seven & Five

Geography:

The world's seven Continents & five Oceans -

- Use world maps, atlases and globes to identify the United Kingdom and its countries, as well as the countries, continents and oceans studied.
- Name, locate and identify characteristics of the four countries and capital cities of the United Kingdom and its surrounding seas.
- Name and locate the world's continents and oceans.

Use basic geographical vocabulary to refer to:

- key physical features, including: beach, coast, forest, hill, mountain, ocean, river, soil, valley, vegetation and weather.
- key human features, including: city, town, village, factory, farm, house, office and shop.

Computing:

Textiles-
